"Lessons by Paul: The Building Blocks of Family Fellowship -Part 5"

Romans 12:12 (Hebrews 6:13-20)

Rejoicing in hope, persevering in tribulation, devoted to prayer. (NASB)

- The third part of the triangle;
 - O We rejoice because we have hope in Jesus
 - o Because of that hope we can persevere in tribulation
 - In all of it we stay in an attitude of prayer
- Paul also writes about the attitude of prayer in I Thess 5:16-18
 - Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.
 - It is in that time of prayer that we are constantly reminded of our hope and the reason we have it
 - Forgiveness of our sins (Acts 10:43)
 - His presence in our lives (Heb 13:5)
 - Our promise to be with Him one day (John 14:3)

• Examining Prayer again:

- Challenge your perception of prayer
 - My understanding growing up
 - Pray at church, meals, before bed
 - Posture (for a child) but did that ever really change?
- Prayer, in the biblical perspective, is spontaneous throughout the course of our day
 - There is a structure present but our relationship with Jesus Christ makes it a deeply personal activity not one of duty or mindless repetition
 - Yoga mantras
 - The purpose of emptying or clearing the mind
 - My heart AND mind cry out to God in prayer
 - God's creation is one of emotion, intellect, and spirit to remove any one of those is to make us subject to and vulnerable to the enemy
 - True, heartfelt prayer, breaks through forms and structure
- Consider 5 primary forms of prayer found in the Bible
 - Petition
 - Intercession
 - Adoration

- Thanksgiving
- Confession

(I Sam 1:15; Ps 88:1-2, 130:1-2, 142:1-2; Lam 2:19; Matt 7:7-8; Phil 4:6; Heb 5:7)

- These 5 represent a pouring out of our souls to God from the very depths of our being
- Prayer is often a paradox that we must come to embrace and come to understand:
 - It is the knowledge of our sinfulness which separated us from God while knowing
 His love for us brings a sense of His presence
 - It is the persistent even aggressive petitions of our hearts while always in a posture of humility and submissiveness
 - It is wrestling with God in the darkness of a trial and resting in the stillness of His promises
 - o There is a time to question God and a time to fully submit
 - It is a pleading with God that He will hear us and act on our prayer and a surrender of trust and confidence that He will act in His perfect will and His perfect time
- Devoted to prayer does not mean that is all that I do
 - o I am devoted to my wife but I don't spend every single second of the day with her
 - Rather my devotion to her means that everything in my life is effected by that devotion and by her
 - o Devoted to prayer means that prayer is a part of every aspect of my life
- But understand that the goal of prayer is not the absorption of our lives into the being of God that is the teaching of the far-eastern religions and new age philosophy the goal is the transformation of the world around us, including ourselves, to the glory of God. (Matt 28:18-20)
- We should also desire to see a growth and maturity develop in our time of prayer
 - o Contentment, success, and protection alone are the prayers of a young heart
 - These prayers do not stop but we learn to add to them prayers for others; salvation for family and friends, and the extension of the Kingdom of God
- Revelation 3:20 Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me.

Communion

- The setting is the eating of the Passover meal in remembrance and celebration of the deliverance of Israel from the bondage of Egypt
- Our celebration today is our deliverance out of the bondage and death sentence of sin by the death of Jesus and the shedding of His blood
- But our celebration does not end there it continues with His defeat of death and sin by His resurrection and ascension into heaven
- One more step He's coming again to take us with Him to paradise

While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body." Then he took a cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. ²⁸ This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. ²⁹ I tell you, I will not drink from this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." (Matt 26:26-29)
