Completing the Mission

2 Timothy 4:1-8

Last week we looked at the fact that Jesus sent His disciples, and by extension each of us, into the world in the same way that His Father sent Him.

- But it was more than, "You saw what I did, now you do the same."
- What this verse, in its proper context is saying is, "In the very same way My Father sent Me, that is how I am now sending you."
- We then asked the question, "How did God send Jesus?"

Jesus had a very uncommon mission in the time of His ministry that covered only about 35 months

- It was uncommon because it went against what the world calls successful, especially when it comes to determining how an effective ministry should look
 - o He went from heavenly riches to earthly rags
 - He went from exaltation to humiliation
 - o From having all authority to being obedient
 - He went from ultimate significance to ultimate rejection
 - From comfort to hardship
 - o From safety to danger
 - o From glory to sacrifice
 - And from life to death
- And the fact is, He calls us to go into the world in the exact same way
 - O Not focused on the world's definition of success
 - o But on living in a way that we saw Jesus demonstrate
 - That comes down to an issue of not the accomplishments but the way you got to where you did your actions, your words, and your attitude.

This morning, let's look together at what it means to finish or complete the mission

READ - 2 Timothy 4:1-8

- This is Paul's last letter as he is imprisoned in Rome for the second time and his death is imminent
 - o Emperor Nero has been working very hard to eradicate Christianity from Rome
 - He has no better opportunity to do that than to eliminate the first great missionary, the planter of churches, and the most outspoken proponent for the teachings of Jesus Christ – the Apostle Paul
 - Many of those facing death have an unusually clear perspective on what is truly important in life. A message from the dying can give purpose to the living. Paul's dying instructions to his beloved son in the faith Timothy should challenge us as well.

Let's focus on the 7th verse to understand how we too can complete the mission as a follower of Jesus

The first thing Paul says is that he has fought the good fight (v 7a)

- Paul uses this same metaphor of the fighter in an earlier letter to Timothy
 - o In I Tim 6:12 he writes, Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses.
 - ...to which you were called... that is the mission
 - It is a mission unique to you and the gifts God has given you, but we each have one
 - This metaphor is not about a brawler; it is used to describe a military engagement
 fought by a soldier
 - But the end of Paul's fight is not just against those who opposed him, the false teachers, pagan rituals, immorality within the young churches and his own selfprofessed weaknesses
 - He knows that his life is drawing to a close
 - His death would be at the whim of one man
 - O Yet even in that, Paul considers that fight the only one worth fighting
 - I wonder how many fights we engage in that are of no true value
 - How many people do we come against over trivial matters that are more about our own ego or selfish desires?

I have finished the race (v 7b)

- Other ways this has been translated 'I have contended the good contention', or 'I have combated the good combat.' I have finished my course of duty
 - o But it is misguided to think we can finish the race at some time in our life
 - Paul talks about finishing his mission by using the metaphor of a runner
 - A race is only over when the finish line is crossed
 - For us, it is continually ongoing to the conclusion of our lives
 - Paul uses the same example of running a race in I Cor 9:24-26
 - Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. Therefore, I do not run like someone running aimlessly...
 - The first way that you complete the mission is to do it with purpose and direction
 - o How do you find your direction?
 - Ask God specifically
 - Js 4:2 you do not have because you do not ask God
 - Rather than praying, 'God help me today' pray, 'God give me direction for your plans and help me to follow them in all I do today.'

Seek in the Word of God

- With the availability of information on the computer you can search out very specific topics
- Prayer along with research can reveal God's plan for you and direction for your life
- Seek godly council
 - Not just anyone those who are mature in the Lord
 - Not just those who will say what you want to hear
 - Not those who will say, 'This is what you should do'
- And do not be a rush to come to a conclusion
 - God does things in His own timing
 - That is why you utilize all three of prayer, the Word, godly counsel

Finally, Paul says that he has kept the faith (v 7c)

- Why does Paul make a point of saying this?
 - o Because of what he has had to endure in his life
 - He was beaten, shipwrecked, imprisoned, deserted by his friends and much more
 - It is easy to stay faithful when everything is going well
 - It is a true test of your faith, however, when it is all going bad
 - Consider again Joseph of the OT
 - Sold by his brothers
 - Made a slave
 - Falsely accused
 - Sent to prison
 - Forgotten by those who said they would help him
 - Yet he kept the faith
 - And because of that, God not only reinstated him to his life before prison
 - He promoted him to a position of great prominence
 - Because God could trust him in the very worst and the very best

To move toward completing your mission

- You'll need to fight the good fight
- You'll need to run the race well
- You'll need to hold to and keep your faith

This will never be about what you do as much as how you do it
